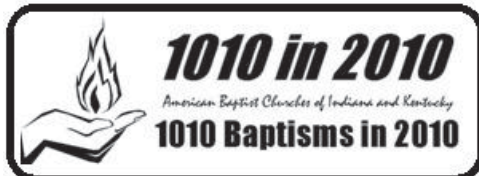

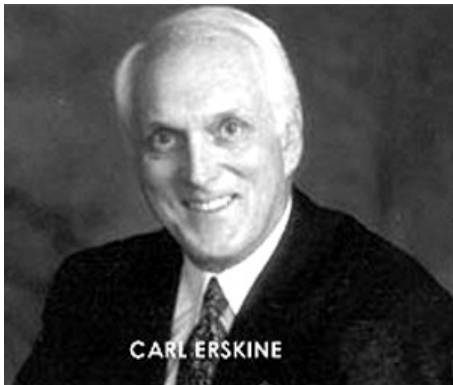


Total Baptisms for the 1st Quarter of 2010

Sabbatical Thoughts

"Sabbatical, A paid leave of absence granted...for rest, study, etc." From January through March of this year that was me. For three months, I read books, traveled, spent time with Pam, visited family, painted the inside of our home, met with executive ministers, national staff and other judicatory leaders, got up late, went to bed when I wanted, and finished a cross-stitch pattern I had worked on for months. The phone hardly rang. I wasn't tied to my computer and the endless string of e-mails that come

in daily. Did I say, **I read a lot?** Pam and I got to know one another better through long talks and trips to New Orleans and Dauphin Island, Alabama. We found that we liked the extended time we had together. I studied in Winston Salem, NC, and spent time in a personal spiritual retreat in the mountains of the South. The sabbatical gave me time to think and plan without having to be in the ever stressful "response" mode. In one setting, I could reflect on the past, study for the present and contemplate the future. Though the primary emphasis for the sabbatical was to study ways that the Region and congregations can be more effective in the time between pastoral leadership, it allowed me so much more.

It is good to be back, and though I am falling back into the routine of my ministry, the three months "away" was wonderful. The time away allowed me to grow personally and recharge my emotional and spiritual batteries – and I just want to say "Thank you" to the Region for giving me this wonderful opportunity.

If you haven't taken a sabbatical, or if you don't provide the opportunity for your pastors to take one, I encourage you to consider it now. We will help design a sabbatical experience for you, your pastor and your congregation. We will gladly meet with church leadership to share the purpose and positive results it can provide for the church.

On Saying "Thank You"

One of the things I've been thinking about lately is how churches say "thank you" to those who are faithful and generous stewards of the resources that God has entrusted to them. When a person gives a gift to other charitable organizations, the response is almost always a thank you letter within days. Tell City FBC Supports Penny Project

Tell City FBC raised 182,804 pennies (\$1,828.04) in support of The Penny Project, a Children in Poverty initiative of the American Baptist National Ministries. The funds were donated to the local "BackPack Food for Kids Program," which provides weekend food for hungry children in three local school districts. Funds donated by Tell City FBC will feed 165 children for one month.

The Penny Project began as a youth project in New Hampshire, and soon became a challenge to ABC-USA churches to raise both money and awareness for children in poverty

One Woman's Mission

Alice Lowry sits in her comfortable living room in Logansport, IN knitting sweaters for needy children all over the world. In 1998, Alice saw a write-up in Guideposts about the Knit for Kids project, and answered the ad.

In return, Guideposts sent her a sweater pattern with instructions to use bright colors, and not to knit a solid white sweater since in some countries, white is for mourning. Alice adds her expertise in stitches, design and color combinations to make the sweaters unique. They are distributed to villages and orphanages where children of all ages are in need of warm sweaters. The bright little garments are truly gifts of love.

Since Alice began her mission, she has made 463 sweaters! When she

finishes four or five sweaters, she sends them to Knit for Kids at World Vision where they are distributed to children in need in the USA and other countries as well.

"There are a lot of things I'm unable to do," Alice claims. "But this I can. This is my mission."

With each box of sweaters sent, Alice receives a "Thank You" card from World Vision. The cards portray children wearing or hugging their prized sweaters. Their happy smiling faces are reward enough for all of Alice's efforts.

A devout Christian, Alice is a life-time member of The Baptist Temple of Logansport and resides with her husband, Ed, along the scenic Eel River.

Brazil FBC AFC Offering Goal

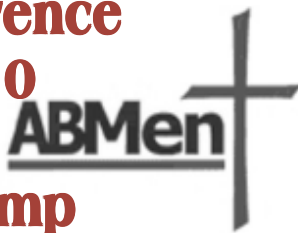

Giving Thanks for Church School Teachers

A few years ago, we remodeled our kitchen. We chose dark, burnished brown, matte finish drawer pulls for the new cabinets. Now, eight years later, a few of those cabinet knobs have become a shiny, polished brown. They are the ones that have received the most use. The ones which have been most touched by our hands. It is the same with us. We become polished as we are encouraged or "touched" by our fellow Christians. This is especially true for those in the teaching ministry of our churches.

Now is a good time to start thinking about how we can recognize our church school teachers by thinking of ways we can help them feel God's hand upon them and help them to shine. You might want to consider feeding them – both their bodies and their souls. A teacher appreciation meal whether it is a breakfast before church, lunch after church, or a banquet at some other time is a popular plan. Even a dessert buffet (with lots of chocolate!) or a goody bag (also with chocolate!) is appreciated. Feed the souls of your teachers with gifts of books or devotional materials. Provide training for them or inspirational opportunities by contacting Discipleship Partners. Simple thank you notes, emphasizing something each does especially well, are also good for the soul. Even



special awards can be given such as, the "always on time" award or the "good listener" award, making sure that every teacher is honored in this way.

Let your teachers know that they are appreciated by providing them with a coupon book filled with discount offers from the merchants in your town. Plant flowers in their honor this spring. Highlight a different teacher periodically in the bulletin or each month in the church newsletter, or use a prominent bulletin board for the same purpose. Have a "blessing" ceremony. Bless the backpacks this fall, the children and youth as they begin school, and the teachers as they begin a new year as well. Another idea is to have a ceremony of thanksgiving in late spring for all the accomplishments of the past year.

Praise! Encourage! Show your appreciation in any way that seems appropriate for those who so willingly serve your church as teachers of young people and adults. Help them shine as they feel God's hand upon them through the thanks of your congregation.

Judson Students Serve Christ in Missions

Every year, Judson University sends teams of students on mission trips to various countries across the globe during Spring Break. The purpose of mission trips is to allow students the experience of service to the less fortunate and the spread of the gospel. One recent mission trip was to Huánuco, Peru.
